### Projects

#### **Assessment of public health skills of third sector workforce**

The first strand of this work, development of a web-based self assessment of public health skills tool, is nearing completion and should be piloted by the end of March 2008. The second phase, carrying out focus groups with the third sector workforce to assess 'felt' public health skills needs and gaps are currently being organised and will be held on March 20th at the Royal Society for the Promotion of Health headquarters in London and March 28th at the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, London. ### **Undergraduate Teaching**

A series of qualitative interviews is in process with course developers exploring how and if course developers use the National Public Health Skills and Careers Framework Competences, identifying cases of excellence in public health teaching, and investigating different learning practices and models.

The Working Group will shortly be making available on our website teaching resources suitable for clinical students, on a range of topics including smoking and mental health. A directory of courses which have public health content will also be made available, building on the results of a mapping survey undertaken in 2007. This will form the basis of a searchable library once the database behind it has been built.
