Our Second Annual LTPHN Stakeholder Event:

'Learning together for better health: exploring the role of interprofessional learning in building public health capacity'

City University's Cass Business School in Moorgate provided a first class background for our second annual stakeholder event held jointly with City on 12 December 2008. It was a well attended, stimulating and packed programme with plenary presentations and workshops from a variety of experts in interprofessional learning and practice. Julius Weinberg, pro Vice Chancellor at City, and Fiona Sim welcomed delegates with Julius chairing the morning session and Paul Lincoln, CEO of the National Heart Forum, chairing the afternoon. Plenary speakers included Hugh Barr from the Centre for the Advancement of Interprofessional Education; Sean Hilton, St. George's University of London; Della Freeth, City University; Hazel Stuteley, Peninsula Medical School and Tim Lang, City University. Workshops were organized to include a wide variety of examples of interprofessional learning and practice from public health and other related areas, including on-going research and development. The LTPHN presented a workshop on the *Healthy Weight for London's Children* Project and colleagues from West Midlands TPNH presented an innovative project to develop a public health training needs assessment tool.

Childhood Obesity Project update

Level 1 training, to deliver basic one day brief intervention training to those who work with children in some capacity, is being rolled out in a number of PCTs in London. Evaluation to date is very positive. Part 2 of the project, to train trainers who work with children and families, who will then deliver the pilot intervention, is currently on target for February and March 2009. This level 2 intervention will be called 'Creating Health for Active London Kids, CHALK, and will be targeted at children age 4-7 and their families. The network is currently recruiting people to train to carry out this intervention. The four day training package is free and will be held in late January and early February in London. Project to develop e-guide to careers in public health

The LTPHN is representing national Third Sector interest in the newly created collaboration of PHORCaST (Public Health Online Resource for Careers, Skills and Training). PHORCaST is a partnership of the Public Health Resource Unit, National Teaching Public Health Networks and Skills for Health, supported by the four UK countries Departments of Health. The aim will be to produce a web based guide on all different career options in public health – a one stop information shop for individuals and organizations on public health careers, roles, routes, qualifications and training. It will be linked to the recently published national public health skills and career framework (PHSCF).
